Thanks for inviting me to speak about A Year in the life of a Dahlia. I have been a member of the Vancouver Dahlia Society since 1987. I started out just planting a few and gradually increased my garden to 200 plants. What with downscaling my lot size last year I only plant 150 dahlias now. Being an ardent gardener, I planned my move so as not to lose a growing season. I became interested in judging and went through 3 levels of training to become a senior dahlia judge after 10 years. I've also trained through the BC Council of Garden Clubs to become both a Horticultural and Floral Design judge so I'm often at Lower Mainland garden clubs to judge their shows. I have taken the Rose judging course through the Canadian Rose Society and have been a Master Gardener since 2007.

A Year in the Life of a Dahlia will cover a month by month summary of how to grow and overwinter your dahlia as well as tips to keep the plants growing vigorously for months. You can get beautiful blooms right up until frost. There are over 20 forms of dahlia bloom, 15 colours and 5 sizes. There's a dahlia to appeal to everyone from micropeony type to grow in a pot, to a waterlily type you might not think is a dahlia, to the giants that are often referred to as dinnerplates (much to the chagrin of people who exhibit them in shows)
